Case Synopsis

At 20:14 CT Thursday, January 4th, 2018 the Witness was situated across the street from the Pearland Natatorium, Pearland, TX., and saw a glowing red light, seemingly hanging in the center of the sky. It then illuminated into what looked like a glowing line, what the Witness said resembled a light saber in the sky. The Witnesses' wife later remarked that she saw it from their home nearby in Pasadena, TX and commented that it "looked like a crack in the sky." The light anomaly lasted as an illuminated line for several minutes but faded to what appeared as a single dot of light. Then at about 21:00 CT the source of light went away completely. The Witness was unsure of the actual color, but it looked red, and noted that clouds and sky seemed illuminated with a reddish color. The anomalous light was very distinguishable from clouds or stars. The Witness did not think this anomaly was a drone or aircraft, as he is familiar with drones and military craft, having seen a drone in his neighborhood during Hurricane Harvey.

Investigative Results

After Investigator emailed acknowledgment and requested further information, Witness replied that they had self-identified the light source as the atmospheric light phenomenon called Light Pillar. Jan 5, 2018, Case closed as **Identified**.
